

Blind Spot Truck Accidents: Why They Happen and How a Lawyer Can Help

The Hidden Dangers of Truck Blind Spots on Tennessee Roads

When you drive alongside an 18-wheeler on I-65, I-40, or any busy road in Middle Tennessee, it can feel intimidating. There is good reason for that. Large trucks have massive blind spots that make it difficult for drivers to see nearby vehicles. These blind spots are sometimes called “no-zones” because cars, motorcycles, and even other trucks can vanish from the truck driver’s view entirely.

Where Are the Blind Spots on a Tractor-Trailer?

Unlike passenger vehicles that have relatively small blind spots near the rear corners, large trucks have extensive areas around them where visibility is limited or completely blocked.

These blind spots can extend:

- **Directly in front of the truck:** Because of the height of the cab, the driver often cannot see objects or vehicles within about 20 feet ahead.
- **Along each side:** The right side blind spot is especially large and can stretch across multiple lanes. The left side also has a blind spot, typically from the driver’s door to just behind the trailer’s midsection.
- **Directly behind the truck:** A truck’s rear blind spot can reach up to 200 feet. Drivers cannot see vehicles following closely behind.

Given these huge no-zone areas, it is no surprise that blind spot collisions are so common. Even with large side mirrors, truck drivers must carefully check before turning or changing lanes. When they fail to do so, the results can be catastrophic.

Why Blind Spot Truck Accidents Happen

Truckers are supposed to be professional drivers who are trained to be aware of their blind spots. However, several factors contribute to these crashes.

Some of the most common reasons include:

- **Improper lane changes:** When a truck driver changes lanes without thoroughly checking mirrors or signaling long enough, they may sideswipe a car riding in the blind spot.
- **Wide turns:** Trucks making right turns often swing left first, which can confuse drivers next to them and lead to serious collisions.
- **Driver fatigue:** A tired driver is less attentive and more likely to forget checking blind spots. Fatigue remains one of the biggest safety risks in the trucking industry.
- **Distracted driving:** Even a few seconds of looking at a phone or GPS can cause a trucker to overlook a vehicle traveling in a no-zone.
- **Inadequate mirrors or equipment:** If a trucking company fails to install proper convex mirrors or maintain cameras and sensors, the risk of blind spot accidents increases.
- **Inexperience:** Not all truck drivers have enough training or road hours to properly judge the space needed to maneuver such large vehicles safely.

It is also important to note that trucking companies share responsibility. They are obligated to ensure their drivers are well-trained, rested, and operating trucks with the right safety equipment. When they cut corners to protect profits, innocent people often suffer the consequences.

Injuries and Costs After a Blind Spot Truck Accident

Due to the sheer size and weight of tractor-trailers, blind spot accidents often result in devastating injuries, such as:

- Traumatic brain injuries and concussions
- Spinal cord damage that may lead to partial or complete paralysis
- Broken ribs, arms, legs, and pelvis fractures
- Internal bleeding and organ injuries
- Severe neck and back injuries, including herniated discs

Beyond the physical pain, these injuries often bring long-term consequences. Many victims cannot work for months or even return to their previous jobs at all. Medical bills pile up, and ongoing physical therapy or home modifications may be necessary.

How a Lawyer Proves Liability in a Blind Spot Crash

One of the challenges with blind spot accidents is that insurance companies love to claim the smaller vehicle was at fault. They might argue you should have known to stay out of the truck's

no-zones. But under Tennessee law, truck drivers have a duty to operate safely, watch for nearby vehicles, and avoid collisions.

- **Interviewing witnesses** who saw the truck change lanes or turn without warning.
- **Bringing in accident reconstruction experts** to demonstrate how the collision happened and prove the trucker could have prevented it.

This level of work is essential. Without it, insurance companies will try to lowball your claim or deny liability entirely.

What Compensation Can You Recover After a Blind Spot Truck Accident?

Every case is unique, but in general, victims of serious truck crashes in Tennessee may be entitled to compensation for:

- Medical expenses, including future surgeries or therapy
- Lost wages and reduced earning capacity if you cannot return to your previous work
- Pain and suffering related to your physical injuries and emotional distress

In [wrongful death cases](#) where a loved one was killed in a blind spot accident, family members may also pursue damages for funeral costs, lost financial support, and the profound loss of companionship.
